- A test that is administered and scored in a consistent, or standard, manner.
- Examples
  - SAT & ACT
  - PSAT/NMSQT
  - AP & IB
  - CRCT
  - **ITBS**
  - MCAT
  - GMAT
  - GRE
  - LSAT



# STANDARDIZED TESTING IN HIGH SCHOOL

#### **PSAT**

- PSAT 8/9 is administered to 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grade students
- PSAT/NMSQT is administered to 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade students
- Scholarship qualifying exam
- National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test

#### SAT

- The College Board
- ~1.5 million test-takers in the class of 2022
- College entrance exam

#### **ACT**

- ACT, Inc.
- ~1.3 million test-takers in the class of 2022
- College entrance exam



## PSAT v. SAT v. ACT

Which one(s) should I take?

#### PSAT

- The PSAT/NMSQT is used to award scholarships to students
- It typically doesn't play a role in the college admissions process unless you are awarded a scholarship

#### SAT & ACT

- These are college entrance exams
- Your SAT/ACT scores are submitted along with your college applications
- Colleges/Universities can use these scores to determine your eligibility for admission, financial aid, athletic programs, scholarships, etc.



# COMPONENTS OF A COLLEGE APPLICATION


































## SAT vs. ACT

- What's the difference between the ACT and the SAT?
  - Time per question, difficulty of questions, skillset emphasis
- Is one exam easier than the other?
- Which exam do the universities prefer?
- What's up with the guessing penalty?
- Which exam should students take?

#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

- What is a good SAT/ACT score?
- Can I study by myself and increase my scores?
- When should I prepare formally for the exams?
- What is the testing policy at universities?
  - Test-Required (UGA, Georgia Tech)
  - Test Optional (Emory)
  - Test Flexible (GSU, KSU, etc.)
  - Test Blind (None in Georgia)



# Consequences of Testing Policies

- Observations over the past year:
  - Reporting was "far higher ... among applicants living in more affluent communities, as defined by local median household income in applicants' local ZIP codes."
  - Underrepresented minority students and first-generation students were less likely to report than were other students.
  - While test scores declined for all groups, "more selective member institutions, both public and private, more often received test scores with applications than did less selective colleges."

## THE NEW DIGITAL SAT AND PSAT

- Implemented as follows:
  - International SAT: Spring 2023
  - PSAT Related Assessments: Fall 2023
  - USA SAT: Spring 2024 (SAT)
- What's staying the same:
  - Knowledge and skills
  - Same scoring scale
  - Same accommodations
- What's changing:
  - Digital (laptop, iPad, or Chromebook)
  - Shorter (2 hours and 15 minutes)
  - Adaptive sections

- What sophomores should do:
  - Take a practice test for the current version as soon as possible
  - Try to get a good score on the current version because you will likely have to take the new version when applying to colleges



## What can Students do to Prepare?

- Understand the types of questions and answers they will see on the SAT/ACT exams
- Better understand the structure of the English Language
  - Syntax
  - Grammar
  - Conventions
  - Vernacular vs. Standard Written English
- Learn to master your instincts
  - English
  - Putting your ego aside
  - Avoid panicking

- Reinforce the critical Math concepts learned in grades 6 through 10 thoroughly which the SAT/ACT recalls
- Take an official SAT and ACT exam under timed conditions to better understand which questions students will face
- Encourage daily active reading at or above grade level
  - Reading vs "Reading"

- Take rigorous/challenging courses
  - AP or IB classes
  - Dual Enrollment
  - Don't forget everything after finals!
- Participate in quality formal instruction
  - Classroom instruction
  - Individual instruction
